Our hope is to continue the perpetuation of lei making utilizing the various style techniques as we celebrate Ka Makahiki o Na Mele O Hawaii – year of Songs and Chants of Hawaii.

There are five (5) categories; **Leaves/Vines, Seed/Nuts, Shells, Feathers, and Recycle/Reuse.** The Recycle/Reuse category encourages participants to incorporate recycled materials or synthetic materials such as paper, plastic, tin, rick-rack, silk, ribbon, yarn, cotton, etc. All lei must be presented in the lei styles of the following:

Haku – Braiding materials in a three (3) strand plait of fern, lau kī (ti-leaf), hau fiber, etc.

Hili/Hilo – Braiding/Twisting of a single material

Hipu‘u – The stems of leaves are knotted together. No cordage or needle is used.

Humupapa – To sew to a backing. A style used for either foliage or feather lei.

Kui – Materials are strung together through the center or side.

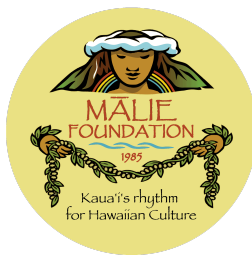
Wili – Materials are placed on a backing of lau kī, lauhala, dried banana fiber or other suitable material and wound with fiber or thread around selected material and backing.

Each lei will be judged on craftsmanship, creativity, uniqueness of material, and its complexity. We invite amateur and professional lei artists of all ages to participate and share their talent in using the Hawaiian tradition of lei making.

Realizing the importance of this event, the committee looks for your assistance in Photo/Video documentation of this lei contest. The entry form also includes a consent portion giving permission for Mālie Foundation to document events. We are asking that a representative (e.g. self, parent, guardian) sign off on the form.

On behalf of the planning committee, we are privileged to be involved in an event that supports the purpose of the Hawaiian tradition of lei making. The beauty of Hawai‘i continues to live through hula, music, poetry and the arts. Ma ka hana ka ‘ike! E ola!

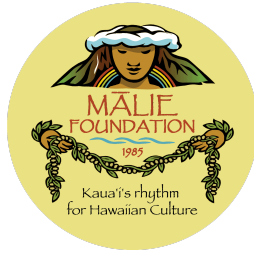

Nā Lei Pua ‘Ole Contest

Contest Guidelines

1. Participants must complete required forms and submit with lei at Sheraton Coconut Beach Resort Makai Ballroom on May 10, 2023 from 2:00pm-4:00pm. No late entrance will be accepted.
2. There are five (5) categories; they include **Leaves/Vines, Seed/Nuts, Shells, Feathers, and Recycle/Reuse**. The Recycle/Reuse category encourages participants to incorporate recycled materials or synthetic materials such as paper, plastic, tin, rick-rack, silk, ribbon, yarn, cotton, etc.
3. All lei must be presented in the lei styles of the following:
Haku – Braiding materials in a three (3) strand plait of fern, lau kī (ti-leaf), hau fiber, etc.
Hili/Hilo – Braiding/Twisting of a single material
Hīpu‘u – The stems of leaves are knotted together. No cordage or needle is used.
Humupapa – To sew to a backing. A style used for either foliage or feather lei.
Kui – Materials are strung together through the center or side.
Wili – Materials are placed on a backing of lau kī, lauhala, dried banana fiber or other suitable material and wound with fiber or thread around selected material and backing.
4. Each lei will be judged on craftsmanship, creativity, uniqueness of material, and its complexity.
5. Amateur and professional lei artists of all ages can participate and share their talent in using the Hawaiian tradition of lei making.
6. Lei must be prepared and handmade by the individual entering.
7. Any individual may enter 2 lei per category. The same lei cannot be entered in more than one category.
8. Lei must be a minimum of 15 inches. No maximum.
9. Lei must be wearable to be worn as a lei ‘ā‘ī (neck lei) or lei po‘o (head lei).
10. Pāpale (hats) can be used to display your lei entry. Other props are not permitted.
11. Lei that are wearable at the end of the contest/exhibition can either be donated to Mālie Foundation or picked up on May 10, 2023 at 7pm.
12. Judging will commence between 4pm-5pm. Exhibition of lei till 7pm.
13. Awards will be presented on the same day at 7pm. A first and second cash prize will be awarded for each category. There will also be special awards given by various donors.
14. Any change to the above information is the discretion of the Mālie Foundation and its committee members.
